

Change Starts at Home and Continues Beyond!





Twenty-one-year-old Vinod Panchal hails from Darda Hind village in Tonk district of Rajasthan. While studying in Class 12, Government Adarsh Senior Secondary School, he joined the school Child Rights Club (CRC) and regularly participated in meetings held on every second Saturday of the month. Members of groups like Meena Manch¹ and Gargi Manch² also used to participate in these meetings along with CRC members.

The issues discussed at the CRC were related to child marriage, child labour, child rights and child security. CHILDLINE – a helpline to report violations of child rights such as unlawful child marriages – was a key discussion point. Vinod took a keen interest in CRC activities and was at the forefront of discussions with adolescents so that they were able to identify, recognise and report cases of abuse, exploitation, discrimination and harm.

The biggest change came when he asserted himself in his own life. He had always resented being forced to

being forced to marry at 17 years, he spared no time in meeting her family and informing them about the legal implications of underage marriage. He ultimately convinced them to postpone the marriage. Encouraged by these successes, Vinod is now putting his heart and soul into accelerating efforts to stop child marriage in his own and neighbouring villages. Community members are also gradually coming forward to support these

efforts and convince members of their circles to refrain from child marriage. Vinod has become a
